**RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE BOROUGH OF
WILDWOOD CREST SUPPORTING OCTOBER 6, 2024 AS KNOCK OUT OPIOID ABUSE
DAY**

WHEREAS, New Jersey is in the midst of a life-threatening opioid abuse epidemic; and

WHEREAS, the State Senate and General Assembly jointly resolved that October 6 shall be permanently designated as Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day in New Jersey in order to raise awareness about the dangers of, and the link between, opioid abuse and heroin addiction and to educate health care providers, community leaders, state lawmakers and members of the public about the opioid abuse epidemic and its effects throughout the State of New Jersey and across the country; and

WHEREAS, there were 33 suspected overdose deaths in Cape May County in 2023 according to the NJ Office of the Attorney General, and 894 of the County’s treatment admissions were for heroin/other opiates in 2022 according to the NJ Department of Human Services Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services; and

WHEREAS, the Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day campaign is sponsored by the Partnership for a Drug Free New Jersey in cooperation with the Governor’s Council for Alcoholism and Drug Abuse and the NJ Department of Human Services Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services to raise awareness of the potential for dependency on prescribed pain medicine and its link to heroin use rates in our state, reduce stigma of addiction and shine a light on the need for recovery support, and communicate to physicians information on safer prescribing messages found in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention guidelines for prescribing opioids, which include considering other therapies, setting realistic treatment goals with patients and discussing with patients the positives and negatives of opioids; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of Wildwood Crest supports initiatives designed to raise awareness about opioid abuse in New Jersey and take steps to prevent addiction.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED the Board of Commissioners of the Borough of Wildwood Crest encourages all residents to utilize the prescription drug drop boxes located at every Police Department in Cape May County, to dispose of unused and expired medications safely and securely.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that October 6, 2024, be recognized as Knock Out Opioid Abuse Day in the Borough of Wildwood Crest, New Jersey.

ENGINEER'S REPORT:

Capital Projects

1. FY 2023 NJDOT Municipal Aid Program – Reconstruction of Orchid Road
 - The Borough has been allotted a \$170,085.00 grant from the NJDOT.
 - The contractor has completed all the work, and the project is in the closeout phase.
2. Beach Patrol Headquarter Renovations-Readvertised
 - The project was re-advertised for public bid on March 1, 2023 and the apparent low bidder was Straga Brothers in the amount of \$2,054,334.00 for the Base Bid plus Alternate Bid 1 and Alternate Bid 2.
 - The project is near completion and a Temporary Certificate of Occupancy.
3. Bayside Bulkhead Replacement and Flood Mitigation Improvements
 - The NJDEP permits for the bulkhead replacements have been obtained.
 - The bid opening occurred on August 28, 2024, and the apparent low bidder was South State, Inc. in the amount of \$5,377,187.00.
 - A preconstruction meeting was held on September 12, 2024, and the contractor plans to begin work in approximately a month.
4. FY2023 NJDCA Small Cities Program-Municipal Building Bathroom Improvements
 - The project is in the design phase and construction is scheduled for Fall, 2024.
5. FY 2024 NJDOT Municipal Aid Program-Reconstruction of Toledo Avenue
 - The survey and base mapping are complete, and the project is in the design phase.
 - The project is scheduled for public bidding in October, 2024.

Grant Applications

1. FEMA Flood Mitigation Assistance (BRIC) & (HMA)
 - The Borough is proposing to submit to FEMA BRIC for two (2) bayside storm sewer pump stations and associated storm sewer improvements in the northwest section of the Borough.
 - The Borough is proposing to submit to FEMA HMA for the Washington Avenue storm sewer improvements as outlined in the recently completed study.
 - Grant applications are due by February 2024.
2. FY 2024 NJDCA Boardwalk Preservation Fund
 - The Borough has selected to submit the Reconstruction of the Heather Road fishing pier.
 - The grant application requests \$3,600,000.00 for the replacement and extension of the fishing pier including ADA accessible walkways, fishing nodes and pavilion.
 - The Borough was notified by NJDCA that a \$1,087,425.00 grant was allocated for the project.
3. Federal Funding Grant Opportunity-Congressman Van Drew
 - Our office has been in contact with Congressman Jeff Van Drew's office to discuss federal funding opportunities for Borough capital projects.
 - On December 28, 2023, our office submitted a funding request for bayside flood mitigation improvements.
 - On March 12th, our office and the Borough met with representatives of Congressman Van Drew's office and were informed that the project was selected for special funding consideration.
4. NJDOT Local Transportation Project Fund
 - On a rolling basis, the NJDOT is accepting grant applications for bikeway, pedestrian and roadway improvement projects.
 - Our office has been authorized by the Borough to submit the Reconstruction of Stockton Road as the grant application.
 - The grant application was submitted on April 2, 2024.
 - Our office received notification from the NJDOT that this grant application has not been approved.

5. FY2025 NJDOT Municipal Aid Program
 - The NJDOT is accepting grant applications for Bikeway, Pedestrian and Roadway Improvement Projects. The application deadline is July 1, 2024.
 - Our office has been authorized by the Borough to submit the Reconstruction of Stockton Road as the grant application.
 - The grant application was submitted on May 28, 2024.
6. FY2024 NJDCA Small Cities Program – Crest Pier Bathroom Improvements
 - The Borough was notified that a \$400,000.00 grant was allocated by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs for Crest Pier ADA Bathroom Improvements.
7. NJ IBank (NJIB) – Sanitary Sewer and Roadway Improvements
 - Pursuant to our conversations with the New Jersey Infrastructure Bank, the Borough is eligible for a \$2,000,000.00 principal forgiveness grant.
 - A preplanning-application meeting was held on September 5th at 1:45 PM.
 - The NJIB advised the Borough that approximately \$2,000,000.00 in grant forgiveness is available along with grant funding for engineering services.

ADMINISTRATOR’S REPORT:

September 18, 2024

Hereford Inlet to Cape May Inlet Beach and Dune Construction

Coastal Engineering in coordination with the corps continues to work with DeBlasio and Associates on the finalization of the survey exhibit maps required for the easements required for this project. Consultants for the Office of Coastal Engineering (OCE) continue to finalize the title searches of the property interests within the project limits in the Borough. Once those searches are completed DeBlasio and Associates should be able to formally finalize the exhibits. The Army Corps’ real estate team continues to investigate the LERRD options for the Crest Fishing Pier. They will determine if we are eligible, what is needed from us, and what the next steps are. I expect to get an update from them in the next few weeks.

New Jersey Avenue

Planning work is ongoing in advance of the county’s roadway diet project. This project will be bid as one project with the Crest being responsible for lighting, parking lots, landscaping, and beautification upgrades. It is expected to commence with sewer infrastructure improvements in early 2025 and continue through 2026. The Taylor Design Group is currently working on final drawings for the Borough improvements while Triad is completing the informational piece for the public.

Sunset Lake- State Channel Dredging- Phase 2

NJDOT’s Office of Maritime Resource’s Project Manager- Scott Douglas has retired. Genevieve Clifton has named a new project manager- Jahan Nusrat for the state channel maintenance dredging. I have requested a meeting with Jahan which will be held in the next month to provide an orderly and smooth transition in management. As soon as I have a date, I will report back.

CAFRA Applications

We have satisfied all information requests from DEP to date and are still awaiting word on the outcome of our ADR meeting a few months ago. I continue to ask our attorney for updates on a bi-weekly basis.

Bayside Pump Station Flood Mitigation Project

A preconstruction meeting was held with our contractor- South State on Thursday, September 12th. Work is expected to commence on this project in the southern portion of the project within a month. The contractor has 417 days to complete from the date of the notice to proceed. Due to manufacturing lead times, those street ends only receiving new valves will be completed in the later portion of this project.

Washington Avenue Flood Mitigation Project

We applied to FEMA for a Flood Mitigation (FMA) grant for this area and still await word on this flood mitigation project.

FY2023 DCA-Small Cities ADA Grant

A meeting was held yesterday with our architect and engineer on the final design of this project. Draft plans were provided. They will be updated shortly. We expect to authorize the bid of this project in October. As previously reported, we received a FY2023 DCA Small Cities Grant in the amount of \$342,720.

CMC Local Road Safety Plan (LSRP)

The governing body has been provided a copy of the draft LSRP via email yesterday.

Also, Collier’s Engineering submitted our Safe Streets for All federal grant application for \$200,000 on August 29th.

Eric Morey referenced two projects: New Jersey Avenue and the County Road Safety Project and he wanted to be made aware of both presentations when we know the dates.

Mike Marino inquired if the building was open and Commissioner Schiff indicated there was no CO issued yet.

CORRESPONDENCE:

-Bicycle Safety (bike path) The mayor recapped a recent email regarding a request to repaint the lines and direction markers/arrows on the bike path for the sake of public safety. The mayor added that the Borough has a CAFRA permit improve the bike path. Commissioner Schiff agreed to meet with Public Safety, Traffic Safety maintenance and EMS for consultation. Commissioner Franco agreed it was worthy of continued discussion and the Mayor added that if it could be done in house and Public Works and Engineering would be available. Overall goal would be to have this done before Summer 2025.

-NJ's 4th Solicitation for Offshore Wind Renewable Energy Certificates – The NJ Board of Public Utilities is forging ahead to award new offshore wind contracts and are even allowing the Atlantic Shore Project to re-bid its current contract at a much higher cost to ratepayers. There was a request to sign a letter opposing this and the governing body agreed to it.

DISCUSSION:

NEW BUSINESS:

-Draft Ordinance for the Occupancy Limitations on Rental Units- The mayor indicated that the current ordinance regarding rental properties needed to be amended and revised. The Solicitor detailed the suggested amendments to include the definition of what a Rental Property is; limitations on occupancy; and reducing the number of complaints from 4 to 2 in any 24-month period. Furthermore, the solicitor indicated this is being done to prevent over occupancy and that the process for obtaining a mercantile license will be impacted and the homeowner will have to post the number of occupants visibly and this new ordinance will act as a deterrent. Commissioner Schiff questioned how this will be enforced and again, the Solicitor indicated it is more of putting the homeowner on notice.

OLD BUSINESS:

-Police Composition – Possible Ordinance Amendment – The Mayor indicated that the composition would remain the same; however, the ordinance needed language amended to bring it current and all agreed to introduce that on October 2, 2024. Commissioner Schiff put on the record that he spent hours reviewing the proposed ordinance amendment and the financial breakdown and feels it would be best path to increase the number of officers and that the Class II program has become unreliable and a liability due to staffing. He would like to continue to discuss the composition and that other municipalities have adopted the chief’s proposal to eliminate the Class II program.

-Lightning Detection System: Commissioner Schiff indicated the other municipalities were interested and it would be approximately 33 k per municipality.

-250th birthday committee- No movement.

-WC Municipal App- This is a 2025 item.

-Old Tourism building use – 2025- This is a 2025 item and there was internal capital meeting regarding and Public Works will need to begin renovating the building if the borough wishes to lease the building out. The borough needs to decide what kind of business should be there and this could generate miscellaneous revenue. The mayor asked the Asst. PW Superintendent to get an electrician to assess and possibly upgrade the electric. It was made known that there would be no demolition.

-Historical museum - 2025 – This is a 2025 item.

-Proposed Amendment to Ord. 1432 – Ch. 79 – Time Limit Parking – The mayor gave kudos to Ralph Grassi and team and this ordinance needs to be amended and adopted.

-Concession agreement hotel zone / beach chairs – hold.

-Traffic Calming – The Administrator covered in her report.

-Back Beach Excavation: Waiting on a start date from USACE.

-Dredging: There is a new DOT contact and the Administrator will keep us in the loop.

-NJ Avenue infrastructure pre-county: Sanitary sewer replacement on New Jersey Avenue will need to occur prior to the County commencing.

-PW roof: This project should be starting after the weekend.

-Washington / Seaview – beach outfalls and capacity: The Mayor indicated that we are awaiting word from Jim Rutala.

PUBLIC COMMENTS:

Eric Morey wanted to bring several concerns to the attention of the governing body. First was public safety with the number of electric scooters / Low Speed Vehicles and traffic calming and he had several ideas on how to accomplish this. He suggested adding another committee to address coexisting with vehicles and pedestrians. He mentioned the jitneys and was told this was a shared service with GWTIDA and lastly he inquired about funding opportunities. Lastly, the Mayor recommended he meet with Commissioner Schiff since this was all public safety related.

Commissioner Comments:

Mr. Franco – Thanked all the departments for a great season.

Mr. Schiff – Echoed the same sentiments.

Mayor Cabrera – Reminded everyone of Mr. Jack Holland’s passing and arrangements for the following day. He also reminded everyone about Seafarer’s weekend and how the borough is constantly trying to proactively address issues that arise.

There being nothing further, Mr, Schiff motioned and Mr. Franco seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The time was 5:59 p.m.
